The 2024 ride season was another memorable ride year in so many ways. Special memories were made while traveling to and from our rides, spending time around those NATRC campfires, and of course while we were competing out on the trails and enhancing that partnership with our horse.

A direct benefit of these clinics was an increase in the number of riders and members which took place last year.

A New Ride Outreach committee was established in 2024 with the purpose of providing support in establishing new rides across the country. Our vision is to send a consultation team to these locations and coach them on how to do an LeD ride with a future goal of putting together a full "A" ride.

Our national sponsor Top Trail is teaming up with us again this year to bring you the 2025 NATRC Virtual Mileage Challenge. Signup is currently underway.

New for 2025 is their new Top Trail website along with a Top Trail Horse Mobile app for both Apple and Android. Now you can easily track your ride directly in the Top Trail app, save it, and you are done!

Your riding report stats and all the leaderboards will be updated in real-time!

Our NATRC mileage challenge is a great motivator for you to get out there and ride. This program is also important as it generates revenue for NATRC.

I am looking forward to the upcoming ride season and being out there on the trails with our NATRC family!

A preacher from a large church goes to his regular barber for his scheduled appointment only to find his barber isn't there due to a personal emergency causing the preacher to either cancel or have his hair cut by another barber by the name of Julie.

Julie happens to be quite colorful in hair, clothing, body art and multiple piercings and the preacher admits to quickly judging her character assuming they could have nothing in common to talk about and that there is no benefit in their interaction or relationship. She proceeds to cut his hair and chat with him, learning about his profession, then emotionally shares, due to her family circumstances, that she has been to his church, purchased a video, Bible and has taken that back to her family struggling with addiction. She is interested in learning about the faith but doesn't know where to start. Realizing his misjudgment, he in turn offers to share his knowledge of his faith with her.

You may be asking, "Sarah...how is this relevant to NATRC???"

NATRC, along with many other equestrian organizations, has been likened to churches in some instances when it comes to "getting in the door", Figuring out the sport and the perception of rigidity and rules. While I don't

feel this has ever been intentional in any capacity in NATRC, it is easy for us to get complacent and comfortable in our roles once we've "settled" into our sport if we've been around for a while. Especially for those of us who have been around a few decades.

We have long established friendships and circles. We have a very specific routine when we get to ride camp for getting our camp area set up, horse comfortable, fed and we don't always notice the new folks in camp as we are on autopilot doing what we always do and have done for years.

We sometimes forget what it is like for the new folks looking to test the waters and see what we are all about. We forget what it was like the first time we pulled into ride camp not knowing anyone, or perhaps with one brave travel buddy who chose to try the sport with us. We forget the feeling of riding in that ill-fitting saddle and being saddle sore, on that fresh horse that is usually a dead head at home, before we started to figure out the ropes. We forget about the first time we read those judges' comments not quite knowing how to interpret what exactly we were reading and may have been too afraid to ask about it. Does this resonate with you?

Our wonderful Leisure Division after five years of official sanctioning has established itself as a solid growth catalyst for ridership, membership and geographical expansion. Not dissimilar to the preacher and the barber, our Leisure Division was met with some hesitation by some of our membership because it is very different from our other divisions. Less mileage, less restrictive in rules, no stabling, team scoring as well as a positive scoring system. It also offers an in and out in one day option for our competitors.

This division quickly became popular in a fast-paced society that still desired recreation with their horses outside of an arena and show environ-

ment. When other equestrian recreational sports continued to decline, we saw growth again. We opted to adapt our options to meet our ridership where they are coming from yet still share all that we have to offer in enhancing the horse and rider partnership, camaraderie with other riders and experiencing incredible trails across our regions.

LeD opened doors and ushered in new opportunities and was the welcome mat NATRC needed to truly uphold our famous saying "come ride with us!"

Our Leisure Division currently comprises 62% of our total ridership and those receiving regional awards for the 2024 season. Our Novice Division received several new competitors either transitioning from LeD, or doing both LeD and Novice. Our Competitive Pleasure division also experienced growth in the number of competitors as well, many of them mentoring competitors transitioning between divisions. Even more encouraging is the number of returning members who have been away from our organization for a decade or better, rejoining to participate in our Leisure Division.

Our history is extremely relevant in terms of sharing it for growth, evolution and education, but it should not become a glass ceiling, nor a measure of how things should be today or in the future. Being open-minded, evolving and taking some calculated risks allow us to remain progressive and relevant in a society that can quickly leave us behind.

By not judging a book by its cover, and allowing our newest division to grow and flourish, our organization as a whole is thriving and expanding in ways we never imagined. There are exciting advancements and plans for growth on the horizon...stay tuned, stay colorful and continue to share and welcome others to NATRC!

Mrs. Kafka was an elementary school teacher and an equestrian business owner, rider, and riding instructor.



Marguerite Eleanor Bayles Sloan October 3, 1931 - April 15, 2022 | Forsyth, Missouri

Marguerite Eleanor Bayles Sloan, 90, died peacefully on April 15, 2022 at her home in Forsyth, Missouri.

A conversation with Marguerite would often switch to the topic of horses and mules, her lifelong passion. In her own words, "I was born loving equine of any kind, and when I learned my dad had a work horse that could be ridden, I was obsessed to ride that horse."

She could remember everything about one's horse and riding ability. She was an accomplished rider, judge, trainer, and instructor. Her accomplishments and awards were numerous. She won two NATRC national championships on two different horses in 1985 and 1992.

After retiring to Missouri, she and John enjoyed exploring the local

trails around the Mark Twain National Forest. Marguerite continued to ride her beloved mule, Jamie, until just a few years ago, and in 2013, wrote a book about their adventures together on the trail. The book, Lookin' Thru the Ears of My Mule, can be found at www.earsofmymule.com.

She had several interests and was known for developing a high level of expertise in her interests. She took painting classes as a teenager and painted throughout her life. Her favorite subjects were scenes from the farm and trail rides, animals, and rural landscapes. She was talented at sewing and taught classes in tailoring, dressmaking, and pattern alteration. Later in life, she took a keen interest in computers. Family and friends could always expect homemade greeting cards she made on her computer, featuring her own paintings or

photos she found amusing. She managed her website showcasing her paintings,

Mary H. Hanson August 18, 1955 - January 11, 2022 | Ithaca, Nebraska

Mary A. Hanson, age 66, of Ithaca, Nebraska, passed away on January 11, 2022 at home.

Mary Hanson was born in Omaha, Nebraska to Joseph and Gladys Sokolik on August 18, 1955. She is a graduate of Ralston High School and attended the University of Nebraska where she earned a bachelor's degree in animal science and a masters in regional planning.

After college, she worked at Waldo Farms in Dewitt. She became a mail carrier and worked in Beatrice, Crete, and Lincoln. She was later appointed postmaster at Ithaca, where she met her husband, Dwight Hanson. They were married on May 12, 1990. She finished her post office career as the postmaster of Ceresco.

Mary went back to school and earned a Masters in Regional Planning. With this, she landed her dream job as a trails planner for the National Park Service in the Rivers and Trails Department of the Midwest Region. Several of her projects were in Saunders County and throughout the Midwest Region.

Mary became the first "horse trail" expert in the Park Service and worked on many projects outside of her region including a 1,000 acre



preserve of equestrian land near Lexington, Kentucky.

As an avid animal lover (especially horses), Mary always had cats, dogs and other pets throughout her life. She competed driving horses in combined driving events in the United States and Canada. She volunteered and competed in numerous NATRC competitive trail rides throughout the United States, earning a competitive pleasure national championship, taking home many awards and completing over 1,000 competition miles. She was the past president of the Eastern Nebraska Driving Society and was a regional representative for NATRC.

She also volunteered at the Worlds

Pairs Championship, the Worlds Equestrian Games, Saunders County Lost Pets, the Nebraska Horse Trails Committee, and many other organizations.

Mary is survived by her husband Dwight Hanson, three sisters, one brother, and many nieces and nephews.

Memorials in her name have been used to help build a new building for the St. Lillian's Children's Home in Gayaza, Uganda.

A celebration of her life was held on July 2, 2022 at her home where friends and family accompanied her on her last ride. The celebration included a ceremony where folks shared a few of their memories of Mary. There were trails to follow to view and enjoy nature, an obstacle

course for trail riders, a driving derby and a barbecue. As Mary had wanted, her friends and



family were able to experience some of Mary's favorite activities.

2025 Appv'd Rule Changes

Changes are in RED.

EXTEND COMBINED WEIGHT CLASSES FOR ONE YEAR

SECTION 4 - DIVISIONS, CLASSES, AND ELIGIBILITY

- B. Classes
 - Heavyweight and Lightweight classes are combined into an Adult class on a temporary basis for the 2025 ride year and will revert to 2022 rules unless extended by the National Board of Directors

VETERINARY JUDGING

SECTION 6 - JUDGING

- A. Procedures: The judges may act together and discuss individual entrants throughout the course of the ride.
 - 2. Start of Competition
 - a. For the purposes of scoring maneuvering trail/behavior, soundness and horsemanship, the horse and rider shall be considered in competition from the moment that the horse is presented to the judges for preliminary examination.
 - Final Examination: There must be a final examination (including condition, soundness, and maneuvering trail/behavior) of all horses by the veterinary and horsemanship judges after the completion of the final day's ride.
- B. Veterinary Judging: Judges shall not discriminate against any animal due to conformation or type as long as the animal performs satisfactorily. Horses are to be evaluated on the following three criteria: condition, soundness and maneuvering trail/behavior. Leisure Division does not have to adhere to these scoring categories.
 - Maneuvering Trail/Behavior 15%: The evaluation of maneuvering trail/behavior shall include, but not be limited to, the following: disposition, response to rider, kicking, head tossing, prancing, standing for examination and mounting, buddying up, trail wise, etc.
- D. Leisure Division. Horses will be evaluated on maneuvering trail/behavior. Riders will be evaluated on equitation and partnership with the horse. Safety may be scored.

 - e. Stallions in portable panels
 - 5. Stallions: Stallions must be double tied...

2026 Proposed Rule Changes

To be voted on by NBOD in July 2025 | Changes are in RED

#1: CHANGE THE END OF THE RIDE YEAR

SECTION 2. SANCTIONED RIDES AND CLINICS

A. Ride

1. Sanctioning

d. Ride year ends the last second Sunday in November

SECTION 9. AWARDS

B. Annual Awards

1. General

e. Ride year ends the last second-Sunday in November.

Rationale: To allow sufficient time to wrap up year-end standings.

#2: COMBINE DIVISION WEIGHT CLASSES INTO ADULT CLASS a: TEMPORARY ONE-YEAR ACTION

SECTION 4 - DIVISION, CLASSES, AND ELIGIBILITY

R Classe

Heavyweight and Lightweight classes will combine into an Adult class on a temporary basis for the 2026 ride year and will revert to 2022 rules unless
extended by the National Board of Directors.

Rationale: Continue current year-to-year approval process. In the 2023 ride season, merging the Heavyweight and Lightweight classes into a single ADULT class yielded the desired results. There were many fewer tiny classes (<3 competitors) and while there were some large classes (>10 competitors), the number wasn't large and was still much less than experienced historically in NATRC. Heavyweights may be at a disadvantage competing with lightweights, but without the merger, many classes would have no real competition. By making the change temporary, it is slightly easier to reverse this change if ridership improves.

b: MAKE PERMANENTSECTION 4 - DIVISION, CLASSES, AND ELIGIBILITY

B. Classes

Heavyweight and Lightweight classes will combine into an Adult class on a permanent basis. for the 2025 year and will revert to 2022 rules unless
extended by the National Board of Directors.

Rationale: In the 2023 ride season, merging the Heavyweight and Lightweight classes into a single ADULT class yielded the desired results. There were many fewer tiny classes (<3 competitors) and while there were some large classes (>10 competitors), the number wasn't large and was still much less than experienced historically in NATRC. Heavyweights may be at a disadvantage competing with lightweights, but without the merge many classes would have no real competition. By making the change permanent, competitors know this is what to expect going forward and the NBOD would be freed up from annual discussions on this rule. Weight class can be reconsidered when ridership increases to offer realistic competition in the weight classes.

#3: RETURN SWEEPSTAKES AWARD TO ITS ORIGINAL INTENT

SECTION 9 - AWARDS

A. Ride Awards

4. The horses with the highest scores from the Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice Divisions shall be the recipients of the Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice Sweepstakes Awards.

A. Ride Awards

4. Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice Sweepstakes awards will be presented to the equine competitor that receives a FIRST place in the Open, Competitive Pleasure and Novice divisions and only if there are starters in more than one class in a division.

Rationale: The first place requirement further ensures that the equine is truly the top competitor of that division and not a recipient by default. There have been instances when an equine with the "highest score" has been lame on check out and had a second place but still received Sweepstakes. More than one class in a division highlights the original intent of sweepstakes and brings back the element of suspense.



2026 Proposed Rule Clarifications

To be voted on by NBOD in July 2025 | Changes are in RED

#1: SCHEDULING AND FEES FOR SANCTIONED EVENTS

SECTION 2. SANCTIONED RIDES AND CLINICS

A. Ride

- Scheduling
 - b. Rides scheduled for the same weekend shall be at least 250 miles apart in order to be sanctioned. A Leisure Division-only ride may be excepted.
 - Priority on ride dates shall be given to rides sanctioned the previous ride year
 - Rides sanctioned but cancelled will hold their priority date for one year only.
 - e. Sanction written commitment for established ride is due by the 31st of January. After the 31st of January, the priority date will be forfeited.

Rationale: c, d and e are more appropriate in the P&P in the Ride Sanction section.

- B. Clinics
 - 2. Fees See Clinic Sanction Application
 - a. There is no sanction fee.
 - Clinic fees for participants will be identified in the application.
 - Upon request, each NATRC region will be granted funds for insurance at sanctioned NATRC clinics, as determined by the NATRC Board of Directors.
 - 4. Scheduling See Clinic Sanction Application
 - a. Sanction application must be received in the NATRC office at least sixty (60) days prior to the clinic date.
 - b. In addition to NATRC literature, suggested clinic outlines and format will be furnished upon submission of sanction application.

Rationale: Not necessary. 2.a-c. and 4.a are covered in the Clinic Sanction Application; 4.b does not apply any more.

#2: ANNOUNCING TIME PENALTY POINTS

SECTION 5 – THE RIDE

- J. Timing and Time Penalty Points
 - 7. Announcement of Time Penalty Points
 - a. Timers must inform ride chair, who must in turn inform riders who were early/late of the number of minutes early/late. any early/late arrivals. Barring unforeseen circumstances, ideally this shall be accomplished within 2 hours of completion of each day's event, but and no later than prior to awards presentation.

SECTION 6 – JUDGING

- E. Penalty Points
 - 3. Ride chair must inform riders and all judges of any penalty points. Barring unforeseen circumstances, ideally this shall be accomplished on the same day, but must be done and prior to ride awards presentation.

Rationale: Sometimes errors in calculating or recording time or other penalties are not found until after the ride. These errors can result in score and placing changes and must be consistent with 5.J.3.(early arrivals), 5.J.4 (late arrivals)., 5.J.6 (additional time penalties)., 6.E.4 (scoring penalty points) and 6.E.5 (faulting horsemanship).

#3: PULL IS FINAL SECTION 6 – JUDGING

- G. Pull Criteria
 - 5. A pulled equine or rider may not re-enter the same competition for any reason.

Rationale: This would clarify that a pull is final.

I've been riding for as long as I can remember. My Dad preferred gaited horses, but when I was 15, I persuaded him to buy me a barrel racing horse. After Ronald and I married in 1979, I continued to rodeo, and we also team roped. I trained horses professionally for many years and we raised Paints and Quarter Horses.


One day I realized my hobby had become a job and wasn't fun anymore. I stopped training, went to work in the school system, and we decided to liquidate our breeding stock. We would keep two colts to replace our aging riding horses. The year was 2002 and I would soon discover a new sport that would change and define my life.

But first, let me thank the many people who have been instrumental in Diamond and me achieving this prestigious award.

My husband Ronald for taking care of the rig, traveling with me, believing always that we could do this, and cooking all of our meals! Thank you!

My family for their support and understanding in what chasing this goal has meant to me.

Neighbors, Brad and Leigh Smith, for taking care of things at home and

leaving special gifts of support on our counter.

My many friends and fellow riders for your help, advice, encouragement and kind words throughout the year.

Our longtime friend and farrier Steve Belyeu for constantly rearranging his schedule to keep Diamond shod and sound. We had a trip planned in March 2014, so he and wife Sherry kept our mare, Star, and Diamond was born on their place. Sherry said she imprinted her, but Diamond is always hard to shoe on the left rear so we joke that she missed a foot.

And a very special thank you to Beverly Roberts who does so much for NATRC. Without her generosity, this amazing journey would not have begun.

See, it all started back in the spring of 2003. A buckskin Paint filly was born on my birthday at our farm. I named her RPH Go Special Star.

Then I happened to see an advertisement for an NATRC competition that was held near our town of Jefferson, Texas. It sounded interesting! Through the internet, I met local riders Paula Riley, Ginger Bailey and Larry Gould, and that fall went to my first ride at Robbers Cave in Oklahoma. I rode my barrel horse Stormy. We didn't place very well but Ronald and I were hooked.

We had found our people.

While Star was growing up, I competed another mare we owned doing a season of novice and then stepping up to open, learning about the sport.

Eventually Star was old enough to start going to rides. She had suffered a serious injury as a young horse, and I was advised she would likely never see a trail. But she saw 1280

miles in competition and earned two open national championships.

In 2012, she and I embarked on the magical journey of 16 rides, the most you can count for points during a season. I was working full time, but we juggled my days off to make the 13 rides in Region 4 and three more in Kansas in Region 6. Star and I ended the year as number one in open lightweight in both horse and horsemanship in national standings. Tammy Lineback and Susie's Stardust won President's Cup. We rode and traveled together throughout the season and made many fond memories.

Star's earlier injury had been plaguing her and I knew at the conclusion of the last ride what I wanted to do. She was retired and I contacted Beverly to ask if she still had her black Arabian stallion, and could I please breed my champion mare?

Her reply came back, "Yes we still have Raven, but he's 26 years old and we haven't bred him in years." As my heart sank, Beverly then said, "Why don't you come get him, and he can winter in warmer Texas and try to get your mare in foal." And so, we did!

March 2014, a sassy black pinto Half-Arabian filly was born. I named her RPH Ebony Diamond, and all of NATRC watched her grow up. Jonni Jewel has reminded me she is special, for she follows the philosophy of being specifically bred and trained for this sport. She is a third generation NATRC horse.

I spent the next few years acquiring a horsemanship judging card and seeing the sport from a different perspective. But soon Diamond was a 5-year-old and I started serious training. In the spring of her 6-year-old year, we attended our first competition starting in open, where we passed on at least three observations!

We continued to work on her conditioning, saddle fit, diet, and all the things she needed to be successful.

In 2022, we missed some rides when she stepped in a hole and strained her suspensory. But she came back and earned her first sweepstakes and open national championship.

In December, she won the Jingle Bell Jaunt, first ride of the 2023 season, and was then sidelined with an abscess. Again, she came back to earn her second open national

championship.

Then it was December again and once more she won Jingle Bell Jaunt, the first ride of 2024. But this time, the magic didn't stop. We kept going to rides, winning and placing well, and staying sound.

Next, we went to San Antonio for the Stroll along the Medina River, followed by the long running Scamper on 7IL Ranch, site of her first ride 3 years prior.

Our fourth ride was the surprisingly tough Red Dirt trail in Louisiana. We had cold rain. Diamond received her lowest score when her

hindquarters muscles were stiff and tight. Dr. Tamara Gull was judging and suggested different electrolytes and minerals which corrected the problem, and we had no more issues.

We then traveled east to Alabama for Sprig in Dixie at beautiful and historic Camp McClellan here in Region 5 where she took first with a high score of 98. Traveling west back home, we just missed the eclipse!

Back in Texas, we competed in the rocky Raising the Bar which became a 1-day B ride due to heavy rainfall. We definitely needed good raingear this season!

Staying close to home, we competed in the lovely east Texas Piney Woods for Leave No Trace, just a 3-hour drive!

Kansas was next on the list, starting out our summer of five out-ofregion rides in a row and a lot of driving.

By May, I had started paying attention to the points, planning our trips as Diamond just kept going strong. On long drives, we would leave home on Wednesday, breaking up the haul so Diamond would get more rest. We brought along our Catahoula, Caddo, who was like her emotional support dog!

May 29th, the day before we were to leave for Kanopolis, Kansas, I went to feed and something wasn't right. Diamond was walking slowly

toward the barn, and drooling. When I saw her hugely swollen jaw, I feared a snake bite, but it was a big nest of wasps by the water trough that had stung her. All day we applied hydro, ice and mud packs, deciding to forego medications. That night, I coated her jaw thickly with mud poultice, put on her lycra mask and went to bed.

Early the next morning she greeted me with a nicker! She had eaten all her hay, drunk a bucket of water, and all the heat and swelling were gone! I ran back to the house yelling for Ronald to get up, that we were going to Kansas! Diamond placed 2nd at Kanopolis Canyons and earned the final points for her 3rd open national championship.

We went to Hillsdale, Kansas for Back in the Saddle where it was very hot. She lost her first and only point at a P&R for respiration.

August was the very long trek north to Brushy Creek in Iowa where she earned another sweepstakes. With 8% grades into camp, I can say that Iowa is definitely not all flat.

I always wanted to attend Ride the Edge in Jamestown, Tennessee, and in September, I got my chance. Such a beautiful, scenic ranch, and Diamond scored an awesome 99.5.

Then it was back to Kansas for Jesse James Rideout where we also got to eat a cheeseburger in Paradise at a local restaurant. So much fun!

We had traveled so far all summer from our home in northeast Texas. Diamond hauled and traveled so well. Always loading, eating and drinking on the road. She continued to stay sound and place high. We were having fun, sharing adventures and making lifetime memories.

The four of us, me, husband Ronald, Diamond, and dog Caddo, were often joined on the road by friend Marilyn Bivens and her horse, Rocky, as we chased our dreams and goals.

In October, we finally returned to Region 4 and Texas for Grasslands Gamble. In placing second and winning horsemanship, we won their special high point combination award, a beautiful hand burned wood plague donated by a new member!

Early November, I traveled alone to the last ride in Region 4 at Bell

Cow Lake in Oklahoma. We endured a tornado scare on Saturday night with sirens going off, and rode in cold driving rain all day Sunday, placing third. This was our 14th competition.

We had traveled almost 12.000 miles and had ridden 810 miles in seven states and three regions. I had asked my horse to do this for me. and she had never wavered from our goal. We had two more rides on our calendar, in Kansas and Alabama. More cold and rain were predicted, and I had family events at home I would be missing. I was packed to be gone for two weeks,

but after counting points, I decided we were going to stay home. I knew we had achieved what I set forth to do.

This year has been amazing. Riding new places, making new friends and collecting unforgettable memories.

Thank you to all the ride managers and volunteers who made this season, and all seasons, happen.

Thank you to everyone who has sponsored our lovely awards, and to Specialized Saddles for generously donating our beautiful custom saddle. Thanks to our regional representative, John Nowell, for your support, help, and beautiful photography capturing our memories. You have both done so much for us riders and are very appreciated.

I'd like to also recognize Kris Wech for offering me her home while traveling, Jan Stewart for her prayer for safe travel and rides, Marilyn Bivens for Diamond's special good-luck halter she wore all year,

2024 National Honorary Awards

Jim Menefee Lifetime Achievement William (Bill) Hinkebein

The quote, "Life can be a hard trail; always ride a good horse," reflects how Bill Hinkebein modeled his life working with horses. After being introduced to NATRC, he knew it was a step in the right direction.

Bill's first competition was in the mid-1980's where he rode Open on his daughter's Arabian. It didn't take long for Bill to realize he wanted a horse with a long comfortable gait. Hickory's Country Gold, an outstanding Missouri Fox Trotter stallion with a golden red coat and competitive personality, was just that horse.

And so, Bill's breeding program of Missouri Fox Trotter horses was born. At least 25 of Bill's horses can be found throughout the NATRC mileage charts. Countless more live with NATRC families

earning more miles, national championships, or simply loving life. Current national board members are still riding horses Bill bred and developed.

In 1994, Hickory's Country Gold was the National Sweepstakes Champion, an award later renamed to our current President's Cup. He won the first Championship Challenge Ride in 1995 and was inducted

into the Horse Hall of Fame for 1996. He won nine National Championships

When Hickory's Country Gold was retired, Bill started competing more of his home-bred fox trotters. Prime Sensation, in his first year competing (2005), achieved a national championship in six rides. He later attained two more and won the Champion-

ship Challenge in 2006. With new owner Cheri Jeffcoat, he won the 2010 President's Cup.

In total, Bill campaigned 10 different horses to 21 open national championships, twice earning the Bev Roberts National Horsemanship Champion award (2005 and 2016) and accumulating over 14,000 competition miles.

Bill always brought to rides:

- an extra horse in case anyone needed one,
- his horseshoeing equipment, and
- friends and/or family who would compete.

Many college students from the riding and training classes Bill taught were also frequent competitors. Bill was a horsemanship judge and ride manager.

The legacy Bill leaves NATRC is through the horses he loved and raised. Bill enjoyed the years of competition, but best of all were the friends he made and rode with over the trails. Bill can definitely say, "Life can be a hard trail, but I enjoyed it by riding good horses."

Workers Hall of Fame Pam Galchutt

Pam has been a volunteer with NATRC for 45 years! In 1979, she began to ride in Region 2 and then, to maintain involvement, she volunteered.

She assisted rides in many positions at Lake Arrowhead, Marshall Canyon and Bonelli Park and helped create a slideshow to present to riding groups to promote NATRC nationwide. She initiated and managed a new ride at a new state park (Chino Hills).

Pam has served in ALL positions as a volunteer. She has volunteered and mentored several new ride managers, ride secretaries and all other positions every year since 2007 for Region 3 rides including Colorado Trail, Rabbit Valley, Chicken Creek, Chokecherry, Highlands

I recently read one of Ty Evans' reflections on training and the standards we should aim for with our animals. a sentiment he often hears



is "I don't need any of that fancy stuff; I just want to go down the trail,". At one point I was one of the people who said it. I used that exact phrase far too often, not realizing how naive I was.

I used to call "fancy stuff" what Ty calls control. This "fancy" training includes yielding the fore and hinds, flexing softly, or being able to smoothly side-pass on command. When I'm deep in the backcountry, miles from the trailhead with no cell service and no quick access to help, I want as much control as possible. Out there, "good enough" simply isn't enough. That level of control, or as Try calls it, "handiness," is what I now strive for in every bit of groundwork, ride, or training session.

I ask a lot of my animals. I'm not one for "intense," but the places I prefer demand readiness. Steep country and narrow trails are the gatekeepers to the best fishing spots! My animals need to be as handy as possible for my peace of mind, and that's only achievable with serious work long before we leave the barn.

A Philosophy

Ty echoes this need for readiness in his training philosophy: "If the mule can't oper-

ate and maneuver accurately on flat ground, how the heck are they going to do it in the mountains and rough country?" His words resonate with me. When I'm in the high country, I need my mules at their best. To get there, I need to work towards that goal when in familiar conditions at home.

During my clinics, I stress the importance of mastering a solid whoa, go, and steer. But I don't stop there—I want those responses to be as effortless as possible. That means having my animals centered, balanced, and able to respond calmly and lightly to my seat, legs, and reins. This isn't about being fancy; it's about being safe.



Safety means having an animal that's light and calm in the bridle. I want a critter that's easy to stop, easy to turn, and easy to back. If I have softness in these basics, I can count on that softness translating to side passes, pivots, and other moves that require control of the front and hindquarters. This is like driving a truck with a big engine, great brakes, and power steering. Just as we want control when towing a trailer on mountain roads, we should expect no less control when we're in the saddle, whether we're at home or navigating unpredictable terrain.

Over time, I've learned more about what my animals are capable of. Before I knew how to ask for more, I hesitated to challenge them beyond the basics, worried that asking for more might bring a response I couldn't handle. That intimidation—my reluctance to rise to their potential—kept me out of some remarkable areas requiring a little extra work to get to.

Pushing Ourselves

When pushing our limits feels intimidating, a good trainer can be your best ally. I'm a fan of Ty Evans because he speaks in a way I understand, but for you, it might be someone else. The important thing is to find someone whose guidance helps you rise to meet your animals where they are—and where they can go. Strive to be the person your animal deserves.

For those looking to build control and readiness in their animals, consider practicing and refining the foundational skills: a responsive whoa, rotating on the fore, and a smooth backup. These exercises can set the stage for a more advanced partnership,

where trust and responsiveness grow hand-inhand with control.

A Way of Life

I absolutely love to ride, and I do it often. As of December 31, 2024, I've logged 22,207 miles on Beau, my 18 -year-old Quarter Horse Mule. I am 66 and had both knees replaced in October of 2023. Our first ride was on June 16, 2014, and we've been inseparable ever since. We live in south-central Montana, where winters can be harsh, but we saddle up and ride year-round.

If the sun is shining, the wind is calm, and the temperature is hovering around 20 degrees, I'm all in for a long ride. In fact, we often rack up more miles in the winter because we're limited to the ranch and primitive county roads that surround us. While I prefer the forests and wilderness areas, the roads allow us to cover more ground.

Beau is a gentle and loving soul. He gets along with other equines and dogs and is not fazed by wildlife. Our little dog, Aghy, a 7-yearold miniature Aussie cross, joins us on most of our day rides. She's still good for 30+ miles and comes home tired but with a big, satisfied dog smile.

The peace I feel while riding is hard to describe. It's a deep sense of grounding and tranquility that stays with me long after we return home. I mostly ride alone, and for me, it's not about speed or distance. It's about the quality of our time together and the beauty we witness along the way. I never ride without my camera, and over the years, I've taken thousands of photos. They help me share the

wonder of my rides with my spouse, fellow equine enthusiasts, and those who may never get the chance to travel or explore the way we do. In the summer, we venture into the mountains of Montana and Wyoming for overnight and week-long adventures. My camping setup is simple but cozy— I sleep in the tiny tack room of my trailer and secure Beau

alpine lakes. I'm not a catch-andrelease angler; I believe in savoring the bounty of the land.

I always bring along a hand saw since fallen timber is a constant in

our forests. As a volunteer, I've spent countless hours clearing trails with the local Backcountry Horsemen group.

Beau has a unique way of alerting to everything around him. With a subtle yet clear signal, he slows down or comes to a stop, lifts his head, and then points with his nose toward whatever has caught his attention. It could be a herd of elk in the distance, a mountain lion on the ground, a porcupine perched in a tree, or

even a boulder that's been dislodged from a cliff since our last visit.

Every mile, every ride, and every moment with Beau is a reminder of the deep bond we share and the beauty of the world around us. Whether we're exploring quiet backroads, tracking wildlife, or simply enjoying the stillness of a winter morning, these rides are more than just a journey—they're a way of life.



Judges Committee

A Few Words from the JC

Consistency and Balance. One of the greatest concerns the Judges Committee continues to hear is inconsistency among judges. Judges bring their style and personality to an event, but ultimately the way an event is scored must be relatively consistent. In fact, the main reason to create NATRC was to establish uniform rules and judging procedures. Social media is currently serving to demonstrate inconsistencies and providing a platform for competitors to express complaints.

During 2025, the Judges Committee will continue to focus on bringing balance and consistency to the riders. We are reminding our judges that "Your individual exceptions to the rules and judging guidelines, regardless of how valid the reasons, create confusion for riders who compete in many rides and may deprive them of otherwise just awards." The

longevity of NATRC will partly be dependent on our judges bringing a consistent effort.

Time Penalty Points. These were a large problem in 2024. Getting time back: Rule Book Sect 5 J 9. reads, "Official delays. If horses are delayed by ride chair, trailmaster, or judges, the time lost will be credited to the rider's maximum time. The minimum time is not affected."

It doesn't say riders have to report it to the secretary to be entitled to the time. If a judge holds you up, it's on the judge to help keep track. We have reminded judges to keep track of hold time at obstacles or remind riders to give times to their secretary; it's a mutual responsibility.

Focus. Our veterinarians should focus on what they are trained to do and that is to judge for metabolic conditioning, soundness, and behavior. The project to rebalance the scoring by focusing more on actual behavior has worked well. We aren't

seeing multi-part obstacles with stacked deductions. Riders seem happier with more reasonable scores. The guidelines for scoring MT/B are on the back of the scorecard

Reminders for Judges. Reminders for our horsemanship judges:

- Tack, trail care, and trail safety & courtesy are important categories on the scorecard.
- Terms like "rushing" and "sore back" are comments for the horse card. Horsemanship judges can comment on what the rider could do to deal with the issue.

All judges always should consider "Are the obstacles safe? Appropriate? Do they affect the flow of the ride?"

Have a safe and enjoyable 2025 ride season, and remember, the Judges Committee is always available to hear your questions and concerns.



From Tamara Gull, DVM

Upon recommendation by the Vet Drug Committee, the NBOD approved changes to Appendices A and F of the drug rule on 10-1-2024.

Appendix A. Prohibited Substances - two additions.

Zylkene (alpha-casozepine). This drug is marketed as a "behavior supplement to help horses relax, adapt to new environments, and cope with challenging situations." Although It would be covered in Appendix B, Prohibited Categories, (Substances designed, marketed, and/or administered to affect the behavior of an equine in a calming (tranquilizing) or energizing (stimulating) manner. This is to include herbal products.) it was added to Appendix A. for clarity.

Vet Drug Committee

Medroxprogesterone acetate (Depo Provera). The AAEP position statement: "Medroxyprogesterone acetate (MPA) is a synthetic progestin hormone administered to mares off-label in an attempt to suppress behavioral estrus. However, a controlled research study found that MPA was not effective at suppression of behavioral estrus. (1) Many veterinarians believe MPA modifies behavior by producing a calming effect in the horse and does not have a therapeutic benefit that goes beyond this behavior modification. Therefore, the AAEP recommends that MPA should not be administered to horses in competition." This was added Appendix A. to be in alignment with other organizations such as AERC, USEF, and the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium.


Approved Changes to the Drug Rule Appendices

Appendix F. Prohibited Treatments - one addition - Patches such as AcuLife.

Patches marketed to relieve pain via acupressure points (sample link) were used on a horse in a recent ride. The rider apparently said they hadn't been questioned before, and those at the ride couldn't find anything to specifically address them. Whether or not these patches work, products to relieve pain are counter to the spirit of the sport.

Appendix F.3. now reads, "Any manipulative using an external device or instrument such as devices to manipulate or stimulate acupressure or response points, including but not limited to bioscans, laser lights, magnetic stimulation, AcuLife Patches or similar products."

You completed the ride – congratulations! Now what?

Before getting comfortable or visiting, you need to take care of your horse. While your horse is munching on some well-deserved hay, there are a few things you can do to help him recover faster.

In the first half-hour, it's important to get some carbohydrates into your horse. It can be grain a mash of beet pulp, or hay pellets, if your horse is willing to eat wet food. Getting some carbs in them within the first half-hour goes a long way towards replenishing muscle glycogen so they are not as stiff and sore the next day.

Most horses are ravenous after a ride. If yours isn't, ask a control or treatment vet to take a look at them. We are there to help your horse get through the ride as safely as possible.

Get as much mud/dirt/sweat off as you can so their skin stays healthy. Obviously, you don't want to soak a horse if it's cold, but you can sponge and brush a lot of it off. For the first two hours after a ride, I like to use ice boots – 20 minutes on, 20 off. If you want to poultice post-ride, wait at least these two hours so tendon temperature is back to normal. Increased tendon temperature is associated with increased tendon injury. In between icings, a gentle walk/ graze will help keep them loose – but if they want to nap, let them! It

won't be long and is very restorative.

If everyone in the vet check is wearing jackets, you should have a cooler on your horse even if you are warm in a t-shirt. It will keep the superficial vessels open and allow the horse to cool faster.

If you're actually cold, even though you've been riding, add more blankets. Fleece under another blanket will help wick way moisture from your horse while keeping them toasty. Make sure lots of fresh water is available.

After hot rides, offering a bucket of plain water and one with electrolytes will allow your horse to drink what they like and help replenish what they've lost. On hot days, it's helpful to sponge/hose your horse periodically after their initial cooling. They will be getting rid of excess heat for one to two hours after the ride.

If the ride vet recommended an anti-inflammatory after the ride, remember to decrease the dose to one third of normal because your horse is most likely dehydrated. If your horse received a B or C on muscle, walking periodically will help. Forced marching and trotting/longeing is not needed. Just an occasional mosey for available grass is sufficient. This is especially important if your horse is tied or in a stall in camp. If your horse is crampy, be very careful moving them while they are still tight.

Check tack areas for heat, soreness and swelling an hour after the ride. These areas can become numb while riding if there are areas with pressure and problems often don't show up immediately after riding.

If you're standing for best condi-

tion, you will have time to offer a grain meal and get 20 minutes of ice boots before presenting. Remember to clean you horse up before bringing them to the vet. I assume you're hiding something if I can't see their legs.

The vet should be able to see and feel legs without getting mud or Desitin-covered. A quick trot-out to make sure your horse is still sound before presenting is a good idea, but endless longeing to keep them loose is not.

For one thing, a standing pulse is taken as soon as you present and that counts towards recovery score. For another, you're cutting into their rest time unnecessarily and could be making a crampy horse worse.

If at all possible, stay the night after the ride to let your horse recover and rehydrate before getting back on the trailer, especially if your trip will be more than two hours.

Obviously any of these suggestions would be overridden by a control judge's recommendations since they evaluated your horse.

Now get something to eat and take a nap. You earned it!

Editor's notes:

- Poulticing, topicals, and drugs like antiinflammatories are not allowed during NATRC competition.
- All horses in NATRC competitions are examined after the ride. Check with the ride vet about using ice boots before that exam.
- A standing pulse at the end of an NATRC ride would be scored as part of the Cardiac Recovery Index.

Protest Report By Marla Stucky

It was determined that horse "Chics Voodoo" belonging to and ridden by Karen Stewart at the Southern Trails CTR, Leisure Division, on November 16-17, 2024, tested positive for the drug firocoxib; brand names include Equioxx, Previcox, and Firox. The drug level indicated that the horse likely received the drug the same day the blood sample was drawn.

NATRC rules do not allow horses to compete under the influence of medication.

NATRC Rule Book Section 7.A. states:

A. General Provisions

- 1. Purpose: The purpose of this rule against the use of prohibited substances or prohibited treatments in equines during NATRC rides is both to protect the equines from harm and to ensure fair competition. Equines should compete under their natural abilities without the influence of any drug, medication or veterinary treatment.
- 2. Prohibited substances or prohibited treatments as defined in this rule shall not be administered to or used in an equine competing in an NATRC ride. No equine in which a prohibited substance or its metabo-

lite is present shall compete, regardless of when the prohibited substance was administered to it. Further: NATRC Rule Book Section 5.C.6 states:

6. Entering the ride constitutes implied consent for drug testing.

A committee, formed pursuant to Section 7.E.3.c and Section 8.E, reviewed all pertinent information in determining the penalty for this protest. In communication with the committee, Karen Stewart admitted that her horse had received firoxocib that weekend and unfortunately, she had not really investigated it as she is new to NATRC. She indicated that she would make sure to be completely aware of the rules for future NATRC rides.

Penalty determined is as follows:
Disqualification
No points
No mileage

National Honorary and Appreciation Awards



CRITERIA FOR AWARDS

- For all nominations, membership must be "in good standing".
- Nominees must have followed the NATRC's <u>Code of Ethics</u>, philosophies and procedures.
- Activities for consideration must pertain to NATRC, not extracurricular activities.
- Nominees must have not had a history of exhibiting behavior unbecoming an ambassador of the sport whether or not that resulted in a formal letter of concern or complaint".

RECOGNITION LEVELS

Regional Appreciation for National Recognition

Each region may submit up to three.

Considerations:

- Prospective recipients have done outstanding work for their region and should receive recognition from the national organization
- Examples include ride chair or secretary; timing trails, P&R teams, safety rider/personal, ride timer, rules interpreter, judges' driver, judges' secretary, raffle chair, regional BOD, helping at clinics; region webmaster, ride cook, photographer, region newsletter, 100% attendance at

rides or regional events (100% club); mentoring riders; rideclinic coordinator

National Appreciation

Each region may submit one who must be a member; may be an individual or pair.

The NBOD selects up to three. If more than three have been nominated, those not selected in the first round of voting may be approved for regional appreciation at the national level.

Considerations:

- Prospective recipients have done outstanding work for the region (see Regional Appreciation for National Recognition)
- Prospective recipients have also done outstanding work for national level activities.
 Ex: national convention chair or committee; NBOD or alternate; judge; national committee chair; ride and/or convention award chair; E-News

Workers Hall of Fame

Each region may submit one who must be a member.

NBOD selects one or more. *Considerations:*

- Regional activities as stated in Regional Appreciation
- National activities as stated in National Appreciation
- Has conducted these jobs

multiple times for multiple years

 Will cheerfully and efficiently do "all duties as assigned"

Jim Menefee Lifetime Achievement

Each region may submit one who must be a member.

NBOD selects one.

Considerations:

- Typically has given a Lifetime of service to NATRC
- Usually has been a competitor
- Regional activities as stated in Regional Appreciation
- National activities as stated for National Appreciation
- Has usually won previous regional and national level recognition
- Has spearheaded and led new projects (ex: marketing, publicity, safety, ads, sponsor solicitation and recognition; NATRC sponsor; major role for *Hoof Print;* branding specs; virtual challenges
- Has gone above and beyond for NATRC

Awarded one time only to a person. Each region may nominate one member. The recipient gives a brief acceptance speech at the national convention. Award honors Jim Menefee, a favorite judge who was especially encouraging to Novices and first-time competitors.

Workers Hall of Fame (400 words) One time only to a person, pair or couple. Each region may nominate one member. The NBOD selects one or more at

National Appreciation Award (200 words) Each region may nominate one member. The BOD selects three. Recipients eligible once every 3 yrs.

Regional Appreciation Award (200 words) Each region may nominate up to three members. Nominees may be persons, pairs, or groups.

Juniors & Students

4-H Junior Rider Yearend High Point Team Award

Use your valuable 4-H skills outside the arena and compete for this special award. Trail riding is a great way to cross train your horse for shows, to safely practice your equitation in a scenic setting, and even to use your showmanship skills during in-hand vet checks!

Encourage your 4-H friends to join you at CTRs and compete for this award. Contact us if you would like a presentation to your club to introduce the sport and answer questions.

Eligibility is simple. Compete in any division, nominate yourself, and prove that you are a 4-H member! The specifics:

- 1) The award goes to the high point horse and rider team regardless of the divi-
- 2) Your self-nomination must occur before the end of the ride year, the last Sunday in November.
- You must: (a) be a competing member, (b) nominate yourself by contacting our ED, and (c) have your 4-H leader contact our ED to confirm that you are a 4-H member.

Additionally, in a number of states (Colorado for example), 4-H now recognizes competitive trail as a qualifying activity for a 4-H member's project. How cool is that? To document each ride, use this form.

Student Loan & **Scholarship Program**

Student loans and scholarships are available at the amount assigned by the National Board of Directors. Fulltime students who have been members, or whose families have been active members for at least 3 years, preferred. We also consider students, or whose families, who have been active for less than 3 years but more than 6 months.

Priority: 1st, a student enrolled in an accredited School of Veterinary Medicine; 2nd, in studies leading to a degree in Animal Science, Nutrition, Health and/or other related equine field; 3rd, in other related equine studies; 4th, a college student in his/her senior year, then junior, sophomore, freshman. For a student loan, a student enrolled in other studies may be considered.

Scholastic achievement, financial need, and character, are also noted.
